



ERASMUS+ Program

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
Promoting Internationalization:

Professor Christos Michalakelis, president and co-founder of Study in Greece, the official

project promoting Greece as an international education destination, emphasized that Greece offers excellent quality studies at relatively low costs, combined with the benefits of a Mediterranean country. The country's favorable weather conditions, rich cultural heritage, hospitable people, and talented youth further contribute to its appeal as an educational destination. Additionally, Greece's status as a stable and safe EU member state, situated at the crossroads of Europe, Asia, and Africa, adds to its allure.

Interest in the program has been expressed by all higher education institutions in Greece, as well as 61 universities in the United Kingdom, including several prestigious Russell Group universities such as Imperial College London, Durham University, University of Warwick, University of Exeter, University of Glasgow, University of Leeds, University of York, University of Nottingham, University of Liverpool, and Cardiff University.

The University of Athens, for instance, is co-organizing an Intensive Summer Course on Migration and Refugee Studies in Greece with Harvard University's FXB Center for Health and Human Rights. The university also collaborates with Boston and Yale Universities to organize a Summer Course in Classical Greece and a Center for Excellence for Environmental Sciences and Public Health, respectively.

In addition, the National Technical
University of Athens hosts a summer school
in cooperation with Columbia University
from New York. Greek researchers from
Johns Hopkins University and Ionian
University are working together to address
the epidemic of Alzheimer's disease and
related disorders in Greece. Furthermore,
the University of Piraeus is organizing the
first MSc in American Studies program in

Greece in collaboration with New York
University's Center for Global Affairs (CGA).
Athens University of Economics and
Business collaborates with Kelley School of
Business at Indiana University, and Aristotle
University of Thessaloniki partners with
Stockton University.

These partnerships with US universities facilitate academic exchanges, joint research projects, and the development of specialized programs, enriching the educational opportunities available to students in Greece.
